# Pandemic Anxiety: Surviving the Stress, Fear and Loss of Turbulent Times Margaret Wehrenberg, PsyD

Wednesday, February 10, 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

The pandemic has brought with it not just fear of infection, but a significant negative impact on mental health throughout the population, from children through the elderly. Its impact on society and how therapists interact with clients will reverberate for some time to come. Anxiety has risen in all age groups because of changes in how we conduct school, work, and social life and the limitations on being in community to celebrate or mourn life's passages. Depression has increased as most have dealt with the losses of important milestones and loved ones' deaths. To add to the difficulty, therapists have had to work through these same kinds of personal issues.

Explore how the pandemic has brought new stressors and how to reduce their impact on mental health. The speaker describes how to deal directly with disappointment to minimize the risk of depression and create new rituals to process grief and loss while restricted from the kinds of community gatherings we formerly had.

# Parenting in a Cannabis Culture: Tools to Help Families Cope with Adolescent Substance Use and Addictive Disorders

# Friday, February 19, 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

Adolescents may benefit from an educational intervention before their use of substances rises to a substance use disorder level. This workshop identifies the risks posed by adolescent use of substances, particularly marijuana. It offers strategies to help parents discuss the issue with their teens and set appropriate boundaries. When treatment of adolescents for substance use disorders is warranted, it must consider the developmental stage of adolescence and the nature of the family dynamic. This workshop provides counselors with tools to engage the family members of adolescents in treatment for substance use disorders and thereby support the recovery of the primary client, the members of their family, and the family unit as a whole.

It emphasizes rapid assessment and linking presenting problems to core schemas in the clients' cognitive styles. Learn how to assess cognitive styles and tie them to presenting issues and how early recollections can assess style.

## When Clergy Harm

#### Thursday, March 11, 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

Clergy have been abusing vulnerable children, women and men for decades. Public awareness of the sheer numbers of abused and abusers have increased, bringing clients forward who continue to live with symptoms directly related to the abuse. Other clients have relapsed into their symptoms as they have come to understand how little Church leadership seems to have done to prevent further predatory behavior. Many of the abused report lives devastated by the abuse and seem unable to integrate the abuse and their resilience into their understanding of themselves and are "stuck." Many clinicians, unaware of discreet injuries that are activated, shift therapeutic work from depth to support, thus accidentally exacerbating client symptoms.

# Best Practices in Telehealth Technology

#### Friday, March 26, 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

COVID-19 has resulted in many more mental health professionals utilizing telehealth. Telehealth includes using any information technology to deliver services (PC, laptops, tablets, cell phones, storage modalities, etc.). Practitioners do not need to be doing distance therapy to be involved in telehealth. Any use of electronically mediated devices for communicating, receiving or storing clinical information is practicing telehealth. This includes emails, texts, online scheduling or intake, use of social media sites, and arrangements with business associates for billing or other purposes. Best practices in telehealth require clinicians to be aware of a new range of clinical, legal and ethical considerations. Telehealth competence requires all the skills necessary for effective in-person treatment, along with additional expertise. This training addresses critical issues including confidentiality, informed consent, HIPAA standards, licensing requirements and social media policy. Whether you are able to choose your own mediums of communication or need to utilize an employer's, all mental health providers need to have this knowledge to protect clients, agencies and themselves. **Satisfies the IDFPR ethics requirement for social workers and psychologists**.

#### The Ethics of Caregiving in an Increasingly Complex Healthcare System

#### Friday, April 9, 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

Approximately one in three families in the U.S. cares for an aging, disabled, or chronically ill family member. The percentage of families caring for a loved one will increase dramatically over the next decade due to many anticipated changes in our healthcare system and federal entitlement programs. The ethics surrounding caregiving challenges some of our deepest beliefs about family, the sanctity of life, dignity of personhood, and death. This workshop takes a close look at some of the most important ethical issues related to caregiving from the perspective of family members and professionals caring for these individuals. This workshop emphasizes applying ethical concerns to practical caregiving topics through case studies and personal exploration of participants' values. Satisfies the IDFPR ethics requirement for social workers and psychologists.

# Integrating Spirituality and Therapy: Ethical and Cultural Considerations

#### Wednesday, April 21, 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

Two-thirds of Americans surveyed say they would prefer to work with a therapist who respects their spiritual path and has a spiritual foundation. This skill-building presentation focuses on strategies to integrate spirituality and psychotherapy. A partial list of topics includes: The Differences between Religion and Spirituality; Religious Abuse and Religious Addiction; Clinical models which incorporate the spiritual dimension; Ethics and Spirituality; When spiritual interventions are contraindicated; Conducting a Spiritual Assessment; Issues of culture and Spirituality; Helping clients deal with spiritual bankruptcy; with particular focus on working with clients with histories of trauma, addiction and mental illness. This course can be applied to the IDFPR ethics or cultural requirement for social workers and psychologists.

## What Drug is My Client Using?

#### Friday, May 7, 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

Recognizing and documenting client substance abuse's physical symptoms has become more challenging as many new drugs of abuse are not detectable on a standard urine drug screening test. Whether the substance is an exotic designer synthetic narcotic drug such as Metoniazene, a counterfeit prescription drug such as Metizolam, or an over-the-counter drug such as Benadryl, all intoxicating drugs produce physical symptoms when consumed at abusive levels. Counselors, therapists, and other licensed professionals should be alert to the signs that a client has relapsed with a substance not easily detected in urine drug screening tests. This live webinar provides attendees with the observational skills to recognize and document unique eye clues and matching physical clues displayed by persons under the influence.
